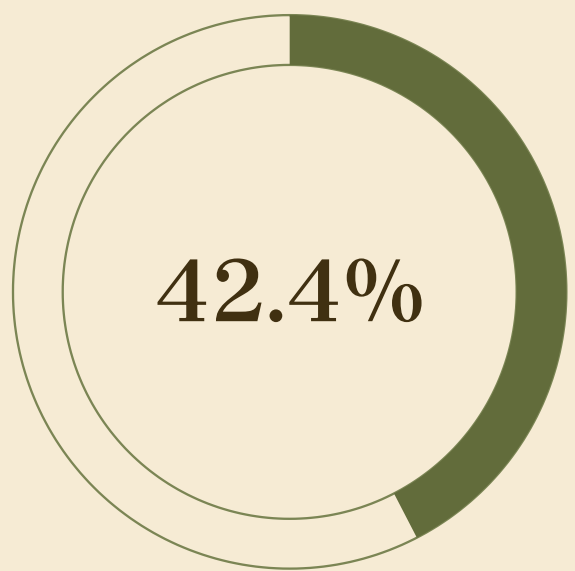
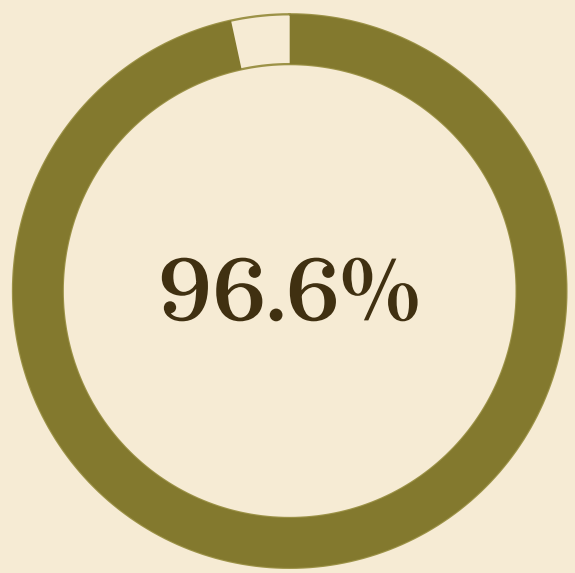


Why Missionary Anthropology Is Crucial For Global Missions
